

St. Hilda of Whitby

During this week, the church gives thanks for St. Hilda of Whitby. She lived in seventh century Northumbria, a time when Christianity was still taking route in the British Isles. Born into nobility, she chose a life devoted not to wealth or power but to faith, learning and peace.

As Abbess of the monastery at Whitby - a remarkable double house of men and women - Hilda became a figure of wisdom and reconciliation. Her monastery was not only a place of prayer, but also a centre of learning and culture. She is best remembered for the Synod of Whitby (664), held at her monastery, where leaders of the Celtic and Raymond traditions met to discern the future unity of the English church. Her example reminds us that unity in Christ transcends our differences and that humanity and peace are greater than pride.

In our time, Hilda's life speaks to us of the power of wisdom, inclusivity and faithful service. She reminds us that holiness is not withdrawn from the world, but deeply engaged with it, shaping lives, communities and even nations, through prayer and thoughtful leadership.

As we approach Advent, may I encourage you to give more time to your prayer life, giving thanks for ourselves, our Church and our community. To pray as Hilda did for peace and reconciliation in the world that is inclusive for all. I hope that St. Hilda can be an inspiration for us all.
